About Country of Origin

The Greek language came to the southern Balkan Peninsula over 34 centuries ago and is now spoken mainly in Greece and Cyprus as well as neighboring countries such as Albania, the Republic of Macedonia, and Bulgaria. Approximately 14 million people speak Greek natively. But it is also spoken in several different places in the world due to emigration, including countries such as Germany, Russia, and Italy.

Where Is it Spoken?

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The Greek language is now mainly spoken in Greece as well as in Cyprus. The ancient Greeks settled on Cyprus around 1600 BC, and that is why they speak Greek. The Greek in Cyprus is slightly different from Greek in Greece. The difference is mainly in dialect and pronunciation.

There are around twenty million speakers of Greek in the world of whom fourteen million are native.
